Research has to consider the still highly speculative nature of geoengineering. So far, geoengineering is discussed mostly in abstract terms and as a global response to climate change. Yet climate policy always takes place in specific local settings, with local actors and local interests involved. Bridging the gap between a global strategy and its local implementation will be a key challenge for researchers and policymakers.

Scholars might take a comparative lens to specify the conditions for effective or ineffective authoritarian environmental policymaking, coupled with comprehensive data collection on policy implementation and environmental outcomes.
Environmental Policy in Fast-Growing Economies: The Case of India (Chapter 29, Jörgensen)	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Systematic comparative research about the environmental policy paths taken in rapidly developing countries is still rudimentary. India's comparatively poor environmental performance, despite active and influential civil society organizations, needs to be studied more systematically. Environmental policy in India is a unique case that is difficult to compare with other cases. But not least because of its outstanding importance as a polluter and emitter of greenhouse gases, India's environmental policy is an important topic for future environmental policy research.
