# BIBLIOGRAPHY

Many general and specialist works were consulted in the making of this book and the most important have already been included either in the text or in the notes. This section therefore offers only some information on versions of particular works, and a short list of suggested further reading accessible to the general reader.

For quotations from the Bible, I have in general followed the King James Version (KJV) out of affection for its magnificent language and rhythm, but where later versions were more helpful in clarifying the meaning I have used those instead, and have indicated where I have done so. JPS is the 1917 translation of the Jewish Publication Society. RSV is the Revised Standard Version of 1952. NIV is the New International Version (1978). KJB is The Koren Jerusalem Bible of 1998. I have also consulted the Anchor Bible and other modern versions, especially for their commentaries. Occasionally verse numbers vary between versions, especially in the Psalms. In simple references I give the KJV number.

The Vulgate is the Latin Bible, originally translated by Jerome, though it has been amended at various times. The Septuagint was the first Greek translation carried out between the third and first centuries BCE). According to legend, 72 Jewish translators were enlisted in Alexandria, and were kept apart from one another but each produced an identical translation (Babylonian Talmud, *Megillah* 9).

For the Apocrypha, Pseudepigrapha and Talmudic sources, quotations have been taken from English translations old or new, as available.

For the Qur'an I have generally used Arthur J. Arberry's version, *The Koran Interpreted* (London: Allen & Unwin, 1955; Oxford: Oxford University Press, 1964 and several later reprints). Verse numbers in this edition sometimes vary from other Qur'an texts.

One valuable resource which has not yet been referred to is a collection of recent research, Angels. The Concept of Celestial Beings – Origins, Development and Reception (Deutorocanonical and Cognate Literature Yearbook) edited by Friedrich V. Reiterer, Tobias Nicklas, Karin Schöpflin (Berlin: Walter de Gruyter, 2007).
