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Index

This Index includes the following:

1. Names of persons and texts important to Japanese religion
2. Names of major shrines, temples, and other religious sites
3. Names of major kami, buddhas, and bodhisattvas
4. Names of denominations, sects, and other religious groups
5. Terms important to understanding Japanese religion

Note: For very commonly-used names like Buddhism, Shinto, Confucianism, etc., only principal discussions are indexed. Buddhist terms, e.g. Four Noble Truths, Mahayana, Pure Land, are indexed as they are generally written in English discourse, with the Japanese equivalent following in parentheses. These terms also appear in the Glossary.

In this Index, as in the Glossary, the long marks or macrons sometimes employed in transliteration of Japanese are put over the vowels *o* and *u* when that reflects the original, although they are not used in the main text; it's the same word!

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
