In three sections, the text provides comprehensive overview chapters on:



- Practices: applied accounts of Quantification, Evidence and Positivism; Geographic Information Systems, Humanism, Geography, Political Activism and Marxism, Feminist Geographies, Poststructuralist Theory, Environmental Inquiry, Contested Geographies

Avoiding jargon, Approaches to Human Geography is written for students who have not encountered philosophical or theoretical approaches before. This is a beginning guide to geographic research and practice.
