The choice of a pragmatics textbook would be neither possible nor necessary if necessarily this book is more conservative in scope than most, and considers the main topics in a particular tradition (ours). This is the largely Anglo-American, linguistic and philosophical tradition that builds directly, for the most part, on philosophy of language and logic of both the logical and 'ordinary' language variety (an exception is the set of topics treated in Chapter 7, which is also in our opinion original). In contrast, the continental tradition is also broader, and would include much that also goes under the rubric of pragmatics. But even within this much broader field, this book is to some degree restricted, since its main aim is to give an introduction and background to those topics that, for historical and theoretical reasons, are central to the Anglo-American tradition of applied pragmatics. The would-be pragmatist who wants to pursue these issues in depth, if her she is to understand the background to a great deal of current research in both linguistics and pragmatics.

One way to think this book is perhaps relevant to the literature is Chapter 6, a brief review of work in conversation analysis, whose enormous demonstrative importance for studies of language use, and its remarkable analytical complexity, directly influence all the other areas that have preoccupied philosophers of language and linguists. This chapter starts by sketching the basic principles of conversation analysis and because of the large-scale conversational nature of the material, it will have more to say about the types of communication that are discussed here. In our Chapter, we shall focus on the analysis of some issues in the theory of speech acts, and then go on to consider some aspects of conversation analysis, such as the
