

## Dexter, Gordon

One of 1976's jazz highlights was the return to America of Dexter Gordon (1923-1990), progenitor of the modern tenor saxophone, who had forged a successful career while living in Europe the previous 14 years. Waves of adulation, particularly from younger listeners who'd never before had the pleasure of of hearing his sound fill a room, greeted this legendary improviser — so much so that in 1978 Gordon decided to resettle in Jazz Central: New York.

Gordon's Carnegie Hall concert in September of that year iced the cake — and his duel with fellow star tenorist and longtime European resident Johnny Griffin blew the frosting off of Dexter's blues, "Cheesecake." "Long Tall Dexter" and "The Little Giant" also rose to the occasion on "Blues Up And Down," which almost three decades earlier helped launch perhaps the toughest of all tenor tandems, Gene Ammons and Sonny Stitt.

The three remaining tracks, all previously unreleased, find Gordon interacting with a first-rate young rhythm section comprising pianist George Cables, bassist Rufus Reid, and drummer Eddie Gladden. Like one of his primary models, the visionary tenor saxophonist Lester Young, Gordon thought like a singer when he played a ballad, and his dreamy artistry comes to the fore on "More Than You Know."
