Dr. Chulanee Attanyake is a Researcher with experience in China and South Asia, Politics, Geopolitics and Security in the Indo-Pacific, and Sri Lanka's foreign Relations. Her current research focuses on maritime security and maritime sovereignty of small states with a special focus on the underwater domain. She is currently a Senior Lecturer, and a PhD scholar at Swinburne University of Technology. Prior to joining Swinburne she was a Research Fellow at the Institute of South Asian Studies, National University of Singapore, and still holds affiliation as a 4602-Resident Fellow at the Institute. Dr. Attanyake also worked as the Director (Research) of the Institute of Maritime Security Studies Sri Lanka—the national security think tank under Sri Lanka's Ministry of Defence. She was a visiting lecturer at the Sridharan Centre for International Studies on Politics in South Asia and Politics in the Indian Ocean. She worked as a research associate at the Lakshman Kadirgama Institute of International Relations and Strategic Studies—a think tank under the Ministry of External Affairs. She has also served as an international expert on an international study group on Great Belt and Road, a project by UNEP and the Ministry of Environmental Protection in China. Her expertise and insights have been disseminated through her publications, in journals such as *Journal of the Indian Ocean Region*, including the strategic analysis “China in Sri Lanka” (2013) and the edited volume “Maritime Sri Lanka: Historical and Contemporary Perspectives” (2011). She also frequently appears as an expert commentator on international
